Title: Colours and Counting

Curriculum links:

- Identify and represent numbers using objects and pictorial representations including the number line, and use the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least.
- Read and write numbers from 1 to 20 in numerals and words.

LIS:

Identify how many colours there are in different flags.

Design and create your own flag using your counting skills.

The Rainbow Flag is a symbol of LGBT+ people



LGBT stands for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trans

Do you know what these words mean?







A lesbian is a woman who falls in love with other women.





Gay people fall in love with the same gender. A gay man falls in love with other men.








Bisexual people might fall in love with a man or a woman.

Kristen Stewart is bisexual, she has loved men and women.



Progress...







When people are born, a doctor or midwife labels them 'boy' or 'girl'. Trans people realise, at some point in their life, that the label they were given when they were born doesn't fit with how they think and feel about themselves.

Laverne Cox is an award winning actress. When she was born she was labelled 'boy' - as a child she realised that label didn't fit how she felt about herself. She is a woman and expresses herself, and wears clothes, as she feels comfortable.

> ASK: Sometimes we call LGBT+ flags "pride" flags, why do you think this is?














The first LGBT+ pride flag was made in 1978. Since then it has changed.


