Dear Parents,

Happy Founders' Day.

There is something both achingly poetic and deeply sad about Founders' Day in what I will loosely call Covid 2020. The distribution of a video, the work of many hands and minds, is our only way to be together and to celebrate our collective existence. We are atomized by a disease, cut off from each other physically but not emotionally. As we try to support families who have been affected by the virus and pupils and staff who are finding the new normal particularly taxing physically and emotionally, we are able to boldly and defiantly assert our existence as a school - something which is bigger than what we are currently experiencing with all its limitations and restrictions.

In the middle of the lockdown last term, we began a process with our pupils and students to address our desire to be a truly inclusive school. Work on this has continued apace, despite our inability to gather frequently. We would like to update interested parents on our progress:

One of the unintended consequences of our current situation is the intense focus on form time and lessons as the primary and complete experience of school. In a normal school day, when all the bubbles mix and everyone is literally roaming the campus, the variety of activity on campus serves as a distraction from time to time away from that core exchange of learning in the classroom. Teachers and pupils report an increased awareness of the

essential component of school life: engagement in lessons, interaction between pupils and teachers about the matters at hand. This is school focused on its essentials.

Schools across the entire city are dealing with the consequences of the Covid outbreak. At any given time about 8000 pupils in Liverpool are self-isolating. The Director of Children's Services and Director of Public Health have asked us to distribute a joint letter about the current situation in Liverpool and the city's schools' approach to this challenge.
