



<b>What will you see in Latin lessons?</b>  Language learning, games and quizzing of vocabulary  Discussions about the culture of ancient Rome and sometimes parts of its empire.  Examination of ancient sources both written and visual (statues, paintings, coins, maps).  Translation and analysis of classic works of literature (poetry, letters and biography).	<b>What are the common misconceptions that pupils have and make in Latin that we need to address?</b>  Studying Latin language always reveals pupils' shaky understanding of English grammar.	<b>What will you see in pupils' Latin books?</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Language work</li><li>• Extended writing (and its associated planning)</li><li>• Pictures of ancient sources</li><li>• Revision notes and mind-maps</li><li>• Assessed work with feedback</li></ul>
