Dear Parents,

Omicron stalks the world. Masks are back on. Teachers ordered to strictly socially distance from each other so as to avoid mass self-isolation. There are of course the usual confusing and contradictory utterances from politicians and scientists. Concern we are told does not mean no mince pies. This new variant and its possibilities allow us all to reflect again on what school lockdowns have already wrought. Everyday we see the effects of the previous lockdowns still blighting the educational progress, human development, and opportunities of our pupils. Year 11s ask if they will ever be able to join the CCF. Pupils prepare for nativity plays which they have never been able to perform. Maths teachers scratch their heads: how do we get these gaps in skills, in knowledge filled. Some pupils find it extremely difficult just to get back into the rhythm and expectations of school life, its busyness, its noisiness, and its pressure. Staff are similarly affected. It is clear to me that wherever and whenever possible within public health guidance we must carry on doing what we know is important, and that includes nativities, carol concerts, and, yes, Christmas joy like silly sock day, something which could never be experienced on-line.

Mrs Cassidy will write to you to obtain your permission for the back to school testing now being planned for secondary pupils in January. It remains policy and guidance to wear masks when picking up and dropping off at school. I want to thank the many parents who have religiously continued a twice weekly home base programme of lateral flow testing. These tests have led to the identification of cases and have prevented the spread of the virus at school. We must all do our bit to keep school safe and open.

Our thanks to superstar Mrs Harper who conducted our Prep School choir at St George's Hall as a stand in for Ms Clark who was, to her utter frustration, unwell. We were terribly fortunate she had the talent to stand in and even more excited that she will be joining our staff from January.
