Dear Parents,

It is 08.15 on a crisp Autumn morning. A slight mist hangs in the trees. On the embankment of the lower field a group of Prep Schoolers is staring intently onto the field below, occasionally raising shouts of encouragement. Around the perimeter of the fields, a trail of volunteer cross country runners of all shapes and sizes trains, pushing themselves forward, marshalled by Mr Stamper. Some are in kit, and pupils point out the swift and professionally attired classmate who has won the last few city-wide cross country meets. But sartorially, this is a motley training session. Lucy P Y3 runs in her jumper and blazer!, others lift weary legs up and down in their school shoes displaying the sort of can-do spirit on which entire nations are built. The effort is tremendous, the spirit glorious. It makes you want to go to school all over again.

When I stumbled into Mr Atkinson's Year 2 class I found a group of children completely engrossed in the raw realities of the two world wars. There were so many excellent questions, including the very probing: Why did the wars have to happen at all? As well as discussion of family heroes, bombs that were dropped on the Prep School, Noel Chavasse, the horrors of anti-Semitism and fascism. The questioning only accelerated, the hunger to learn was palpable. They are planning to visit the dining room to see the bust of Chavasse. I promised to come back and show them the fragment of the bomb which fell on the school. This passion for history also shone through in the Year 5 Vikings workshop earlier in the week, organized through the Wilton Scholars programme.

It's no wonder that our Reception open evenings are so well attended. The people of Liverpool want their children to experience this sort of school. The young tyke climbing the play equipment during open evening presentations is the future UCAS candidate of the year 2035. Reception open evening reminds us of the variety and length of the College educational journey and the power of a school in infusing young lives with purpose and joy. The evening relies on our staff and the Year 6 prefects. They communicate in their very being and attitude the passion and dynamism of what happens here every day.

Mr Briggs tells me that Reception have begun their rehearsals for the nativity play. Even before the beginning of the advent season, intimations of the Christmas life of the school are beginning to appear. Advance notice of the Secondary Phase's Service of Lessons and Carols on Monday 6 December at 7.30pm at Liverpool Cathedral. Charitable activity is also

kicking into high gear. The chaplaincy charity group is focusing on collections for the Whitechapel Centre. The boarders already raised £172.00 with their daily mile walk fundraiser for the Royal British Legion. Last weekend they went rock and wall climbing, this weekend it is to be laser tag.

The Year 12 geography field trip required a reconnaissance mission on her Sunday off, which led to a very productive trip. It's a thrill after the covid years to move around together again and to relate learning to the reality of in this case the physical environment.

They were amazed on their walkabouts to see staff and pupils outside, engaging in various activities, and using their time together to build relationships and strengthen their social and emotional skills as well.
