This much needed expansion will provide us with six classrooms and two additional learning spaces to help us deal with the overcrowding which has stymied some of our efforts. In addition, a pedestrian crossing will be built across North Mossley Hill Road and improvements made to Ibbotson's Lane making bicycling and pedestrian access easier and safer. All good news. The classrooms will house a faculty (TBD) because we organize our classrooms with subjects clustered together. It will enable us to repurpose other spaces and look to improve classroom space across the campus. The building is programmed to open in September 2024.
