

## Principal's Newsletter

Dear Parents,

It is the morning after the night before. We experienced the apotheosis of the term in the Prep and Middle School production of *Beauty and the Beast*. It seems impossible that our thespians could exceed themselves, but, the brilliant team of Ms Clark, Mr Bishop, Ms Poole, Mr Beardsmore, and Ms Brooke have somehow inspired a show of transcendent quality.

Mr Cook waxes lyrical about the character of his football teams. Here is a description of the Chapter 7 boys team and their approach in matches against two local schools this week:

Pupils had prepared two monologues from their chosen play to present to our visiting examiner. The examiner commented positively on the wide range and diversity of texts that were offered at Liverpool College. We were delighted by the way all the candidates supported one another during the rehearsal process and during the performances as considerate and mature audience members.*

Our artist of the week this week is Alfie M (Ch11) with his Bird sketchbook study.



He writes: *"I have been exploring the work of artist Mark Powell as part of my sketchbook work based on the theme extraordinary. I am fascinated by birds, I find them fun to draw, I especially like the textures of the feathers and trying to re-create this in visual terms. Birds of prey with their strength and power are a future focus to explore in my sketchbook drawing".*

Earlier this week we hosted Dr Nick Martin, a political theorist and moral philosophy lecturer at the University of Liverpool, for a sixth form lecture. As ever, our students asked some excellent questions exploring the limits of state power, and the relationship between

individual conscience and law. Dr Martin left impressed and will hopefully inspire even more of his colleagues to come and share their research and work with us. Next term we are hoping to host several more such lectures.

The DofE expedition last weekend did experience some wet and cold (it is ever thus) but returned safe and sound.

Chapter 2 enjoyed taking part in an exciting workshop today about the Great Fire of London. They travelled in time with Samuel Pepys and Daisy, who worked in Thomas Farriner's bakery where the fire started. There was some excellent dancing and a competition where each class made a 'fire chain' to transport water from the River Thames in buckets to put out the fire.
